Porta del Paradiso

Lorenzo Ghiberti, one of the most famous sculptors in the Middle Ages, created these bronze doors for Baptistery of Florence. Named "Gates of Paradise" by Michelangelo, each door portrays five scenes from the Old Testament. It is considered, by many, to be Ghiberti's greatest work. (Medieval Art)



Master of Taüll

This wall painting by San Clemente in Taüll, c. 1123, is a prime example of Romanesque Art. However, there were distinctive variants in Romanesque Art, depending on where it originated. Art from this period was greatly influenced by pilgrimages to scared locations.
